Voter Registration Information

In Georgia, voters must be registered to vote 30 days prior to the election in order to be eligible to vote in the election and any subsequent runoff. A Voter Registration Application must be completely filled out and signed. A voter must provide a valid residence address. A voter's Election Day polling place is assigned specific to where their residence address as registered lies within the designated precinct lines. The deadline to register to vote or to make updates to your registration record that will be in effect for the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election is **Monday, April 22, 2024**.

All voters are encouraged to confirm they are registered to vote and their name and address appear correctly in the statewide voter registration system. Go to www.mvp.sos.ga.gov to verify your information, call the Elections Office or scan here.



Voter Registration Requirements

In order to be eligible to register to vote, a person must be a citizen of the United States and the State of Georgia, at least 17 ½ years of age, a resident of the county or municipality in which he/she seeks to vote, not currently serving a felony conviction, AND not judicially determined to be mentally incompetent to vote.

Georgia Voters Do Not Register by Party/Ballot Type

In Georgia, voters do not register by party. For the May 21 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election, each voter has three ballot types from which to choose: Democratic ballot type, Republican ballot type, and Nonpartisan ballot type.

Three Ways to Register to Vote

Online: Go to registertovote.sos.ga.gov/GAOLVR/ or www.mvp.sos.ga.gov.

If you have a valid driver's license or identification card issued by the Georgia Department of Driver Services (DDS) with your signature on file with DDS, your application can be completed and submitted online. The application must be dated and time-stamped no later than 11:59 p.m. on the Voter Registration Deadline date in order to be eligible to vote in the upcoming election.

In person: You can register to vote at the Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office, located at 1201 Sawnee Drive, Cumming, GA 30040 or at any of the four public libraries in the County. The Elections Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The application must be delivered to our office no later than the close of business on the Voter Registration Deadline date in order to be eligible to vote in the upcoming election. The public libraries are open every day with varying hours. For library registrations, the application must be submitted by their close of business on the Voter Registration Deadline date in order to be eligible to vote in the upcoming election.

By mail: The application must be USPS postmarked by the Voter Registration Deadline date. Applications can be downloaded at www.forsythco.com/vote and are also available at the Elections Office and at any public library.

All properly completed applications received by the Voter Registrations & Elections Office that do not meet the April 22 deadline will be processed after the certification of the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election results.

The Ballot

The May 21 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election ballot consists of Congressional and state-level offices, county and district level offices, and nonpartisan offices, as well as state and local political party questions. The ballot style chosen by the voter will determine the contests and questions on their ballot.

Note: The Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office has the duty to prepare for the election, hold the election, and facilitate voting for all voters. We understand and appreciate that voters often request additional information and ask for clarity about candidates and questions that appear on the ballot. Office staff and poll workers are not able to provide partisan/nonpartisan information about candidates, parties or questions that appear on the ballot. Office staff and poll workers must always remain completely apolitical and nonpartisan. Voters are encouraged to research candidates and issues on the ballot prior to coming to the polls to vote.

Ballot Details

What is a general primary election?

A primary is held by a political party to nominate candidates for public office to be voted on in the ensuing November General Election.

What is a nonpartisan general election?

A Nonpartisan general election is held to elect those offices for which it has been determined by Georgia Election Code that the candidates shall not qualify with any political party. The local offices which will be elected in the May 21 Nonpartisan General Election are State Court and Superior Court judges and Chief Magistrate. The Nonpartisan General Election ballot also includes statewide offices for Georgia Supreme Court and Court of Appeals judges.

Georgia voters do not register to vote by party

In Georgia, voters do not register by party. Voters have a choice on the ballot type they vote in a Primary Election. For the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election, each voter will choose one of the three ballot types when requesting a ballot.

The **Democratic** ballot type contains **ONLY**:

- the candidates who qualified with the **Democratic** Party for each partisan race in the districts that are up for election this year AND
- the straw poll questions submitted by the state and county Democratic Party AND
- the Nonpartisan General election contests

The **Republican** ballot type contains **ONLY**:

- the candidates who qualified with the **Republican** Party for each partisan race in the districts that are up for election this year AND
- the straw poll questions submitted by the state Republican Party AND
- the Nonpartisan General election contests

The **Nonpartisan** ballot type contains **ONLY**:

- the nonpartisan general election candidates.
- This ballot type does NOT contain any races/candidates/questions from either the Democratic or Republican Parties.

Questions on the ballot

During a primary, per Georgia Election Code, each party is permitted to ask yes/no questions of the voter. These are non-binding questions which means no change in law will result based on the outcome of the election. These questions are often referred to as 'straw poll' or 'opinion poll' questions. The questions submitted by each party are different. For this ballot, the state Republican Party poses 8 questions on the Republican ballot type. The state Democratic Party poses 8 questions on the Democratic ballot type and the Forsyth County Democratic Party poses 7 questions.

What happens to the winner of a primary/primary runoff?

The winner of the Republican primary (or primary runoff) in a specific race will be the person whose name appears on the ballot in the general election as the Republican designee. Likewise, the winner of the Democratic primary (or primary runoff) in a specific race will be the person whose name appears on the ballot in the general election as the Democratic designee. In Georgia, a runoff is necessary when no candidate in a specific race receives a majority of the votes cast, i.e., 50 percent of the votes cast plus one vote. The runoff will be comprised of the two candidates who received the most votes in the primary.

Choosing a ballot type for a Primary Runoff

If a runoff is needed, it will be held on Tuesday, June 18, 2024. Voters who chose a Democratic ballot in the general primary can only vote a Democratic ballot in the primary runoff. Voters who chose a Republican ballot in the general primary can only vote a Republican ballot in the primary runoff. Registered voters who did not vote in the general primary or who voted a Nonpartisan ballot type can choose a Democratic, Republican or Nonpartisan (if applicable) ballot type in the primary runoff.

Sample Ballot

This guide includes a consolidated Democratic Primary Sample Ballot, a consolidated Republican Primary Sample Ballot, and a Nonpartisan Sample Ballot for voters to review. A voter's ballot will contain only the State Senate and State House of Representatives contests for the district that represents the voter based on their residential address as registered to vote. A voter's ballot may also include a contest for Forsyth County Commissioner (districts 2, 4, 5) or Board of Education (districts 3, 4, 5) depending on the voter's assigned districts. Copies of the sample ballots will be available for review at the polling place. Voters are encouraged to review their sample ballots prior to going to the polls to vote. Each voter voting in the general primary and nonpartisan general election will select either a Democratic, Republican, or Nonpartisan ballot type. A voter can also view their specific sample ballots by going to www.mvp.sos.ga.gov.

Write-in Candidates

In a *general primary*, write-in candidates are not allowed. Only the names of those candidates who qualified with their respective party will appear on the general primary ballot. The option for 'write-in' will appear on the ballot for partisan contests on the November general election ballot. The option for 'write-in' is also possible in the *nonpartisan general election* races on the May 21 ballot, but NOT in the *general primary* races on the same ballot.

In a *general election*, a candidate must qualify to become a write-in candidate. To become a certified write-in candidate for an office, an individual must post their intention in the appropriate legal organ and complete required paperwork by specific deadlines. Write-in candidate names do not appear on the general election ballot. All votes cast for the certified candidates using the write-in option will be counted. On the electronic voting machine, when a voter touches the box next to the write-in option, a keyboard appears allowing them to type in a name. On a paper absentee ballot, a voter must choose the write-in option and then write in a name. Voters will see an option for 'write-in' on the contests that are part of the nonpartisan general election on the May ballot.

Withdrawn Candidates

A candidate may withdraw after qualifying but prior to Election Day by filing a notarized affidavit. All votes cast for the withdrawn candidate will be voided and not counted. If the candidate withdraws after the ballots have been printed, the candidate's name will remain on the ballot. Notices will be posted in all polling places where the name of the withdrawn candidate appears on the ballot stating the candidate has withdrawn and all votes cast for such withdrawn candidate will be voided and not counted. (reference O.C.G.A. 21-2-134)

Absentee Ballot by Mail

A registered voter may request a ballot to be mailed to them for any election. Georgia does not require the voter to provide a reason for the request.

Request a Ballot to be Mailed to You

To request an absentee ballot by mail, a voter is required to complete an "Application for Georgia Official Absentee Ballot." The application can be found on our website at www.forsythco.com/vote. Voters may also contact our office to have an absentee ballot application sent to them for completion. The application can also be downloaded from the Georgia Secretary of State's website (sos.ga.gov).

Deadlines

By law, voters may request an absentee ballot by mail beginning 78 days prior to an election and ending 11 days prior to an election. Our office will accept applications for the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election beginning March 4, 2024. Once the ballots are available for the specified election, requests for absentee ballots are usually processed within three business days after receipt in our office. The earliest our office will mail an absentee ballot to voters who have a properly submitted application on file is April 22, 2024. The last day an absentee ballot application can be accepted in our office for the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election is May 10, 2024. Applications can be dropped off in person at our office by the close of business on the day of the deadline and can be submitted electronically until 11:59 p.m. on the day of the deadline.

Submit a Completed and Signed Absentee Ballot Application

Please follow the directions and complete the application accordingly. Incomplete applications may not be accepted if required information is missing or incorrect. For example, you must include your date of birth; it is not optional. Call the office if you have any questions. It is highly recommended you include contact information.

You may submit your completed and signed "Application for Georgia Official Absentee Ballot" by using one of the following methods:

When sending a picture of the completed application, please ensure the photo is a sufficient size so that the Elections Office can read the required information.

The voter must have a Georgia driver's license or Georgia ID number in their voter record in order to use this portal.

What happens next after submitting my application?

- If the application meets all requirements, a ballot will be mailed to the voter.
- If the application *does not* meet all requirements, the voter will be contacted by the Elections Office by letter or, possibly, by phone or email if the voter's contact information was included on the application.

When will my ballot be mailed to me?

If you submit a properly completed application, then your ballot is expected to be mailed to you within three business days of our office receiving your completed application once ballots can be mailed. For the upcoming election, April 22 is the earliest date to mail an absentee ballot.

















How do I prepare my voted absentee ballot prior to returning it?

Voted absentee ballots should be placed inside the provided inner secrecy envelope, which should be placed inside the provided return Oath envelope. On the inside flap of the return Oath envelope where indicated, review the 'Voter Oath;' sign your name to affirm the Oath, print your name, print your date of birth, and print your Georgia driver's license number or GA state identification card number. If you do not have a GA driver's license/ID number, follow the directions on the Oath envelope. After securing the outer flap on the Oath envelope, review the 'Assistance section' and complete this section if you received assistance in completing your ballot.

Where/how can I return my voted absentee ballot and what is the deadline?

Voted absentee ballots may be returned to our office by mail, by personal delivery or deposited into the Official Absentee Ballot Drop Box available in the lobby of the Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office located at 1201 Sawnee Drive, Cumming, GA 30040. The drop box will be open during the same dates and hours set for Advance Voting at the Elections Office (see charts on pages 6 and 8 for details). Additionally, the Elections Office staff will accept voted absentee ballots at the front desk window during the days and times shown in the chart below.

The latest day and time a voter can return their voted absentee ballot in order to be accepted is Election Day in our office before the polls close at 7 p.m. The postmark date does **NOT** count. There are special provisions for voters in the military and/or living overseas; contact our office for details.

Election Preparations

Logic and Accuracy Testing of the voting equipment

Logic and Accuracy Testing is a collection of pre-election procedures that insure the voting equipment and ballots to be used in an upcoming election can properly display the ballot, collect votes and tabulate results. Often referred to as L&A, these tests occur prior to the election and are conducted in such a way as to make public observation of the procedures and results possible.

For the May 21, 2024 election, Logic and Accuracy Testing of the voting equipment to be used in the upcoming election is scheduled to begin Friday, April 5 and will continue day to day until complete. It will be conducted at the Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office and is open to the public.

Poll Worker Recruitment

Did you know it takes 650+ poll workers to make an election cycle happen in Forsyth County? Poll workers play a vital role in the elections process – our community depends upon them to facilitate voting.

Poll workers are paid for their time, or can choose to volunteer their time or earn community service hours.

Voter Preparedness

Voters are encouraged to confirm they have everything needed prior to heading to the polls to cast their ballot.

- Confirm your voter registration information is up to date**

Go to www.mvp.sos.ga.gov to review your voter registration information or call the Elections Office. If a change is needed, submit a voter registration application or change form as soon as possible.

- Review your Sample Ballots**

We understand that voters often have questions about the candidates and questions that appear on the ballot they are voting. Voters are strongly encouraged to take a few minutes to review the Sample Ballots prior to going to vote in person. Office staff and poll workers are not able to provide partisan/nonpartisan information about candidates, parties or questions that appear on the ballot. Office staff and poll workers must always remain completely apolitical and nonpartisan.

- Confirm your Polling Place**

Prior to heading to the polls, voters are encouraged to verify their assigned Election Day polling place.

- Photo Identification Required**

Georgia Election Code requires all voters voting in person at the polls to present one of the acceptable forms of photo identification prior to voting. See page 12 for a list. Please remember to bring one of these forms of photo I.D. with you when you come to vote in person either during Advance Voting or on Election Day. Voters who do not have one of the acceptable forms of photo I.D. will be offered an opportunity to cast a provisional ballot.



Voting In Person Early – Before Election Day – During Three Weeks of Advance Voting

Advance Voting in person for the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election is available for three weeks:

- Weekdays beginning Monday, April 29 through Friday, May 17
- Saturday, May 4 and Saturday, May 11
- Sunday, May 5

Voting on Election Day – Tuesday, May 21, 2024

Voting Hours – 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Preparing for Election Day:

- Only voters registered by April 22, 2024 are eligible to vote in the May 21, 2024 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election.
- On Election Day, Tuesday, May 21, 2024, voters go to their designated polling place to vote.
- All 29 Forsyth County Election Day polling places are open for voting from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Election Day. A map of the Election Day Voting precincts and polling places is attached to this guide.
- **PLEASE NOTE: Some Forsyth County voters have been assigned to a new Election Day polling place. Learn more at www.forsythco.com/vote and verify your Election Day polling place at www.mvp.sos.ga.gov prior to going to the polls.**
- Voters are encouraged to review their Sample Ballot prior to going to the polls to vote and may do so by going to www.mvp.sos.ga.gov.
- An Advance Voting Location MAY NOT be your designated Election Day polling place. Three of the four Advance Voting locations (Hampton Park Library, Midway Park Community Building and Sharon Springs Park Community Building) are also Election Day polling places. On Election Day, **ONLY** voters who are assigned to these polling places should go there to vote.
- Estimated wait times are not provided on Election Day, as voters may only vote at their assigned polling place.
- The Forsyth County Elections Office **IS NOT** open **FOR VOTING** on Election Day. Our office is open all day on Election Day to answer any questions a voter may have and to accept voted absentee ballots. However, our office is not an Election Day polling place. A voter's polling place on Election Day is specific to where their residence (as registered) falls within designated precinct lines.

Voting Turnout Statistics and Election Results

Absentee Voting Turnout Statistics

The Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office posts the Absentee Voting Turnout Statistics Report, which includes how many absentee ballots have been mailed, how many voted ballots have been returned to the Elections Office and how many voters have cast their ballot by Absentee Voting In Person (Advance Voting), to our website at www.forsythco.com/vote daily. The turnout statistics will be posted daily by approximately 10 a.m. reflecting voter turnout from the previous day.

Election Day Voting Turnout Statistics

On Election Day, approximated Election Day voting turnout statistics will be posted to our website periodically as available.

In Person Observation of Tabulation

All votes cast during Advance Voting, Absentee By Mail and Election Day are not tabulated until after the polls close on Election Night. On Election Night after the polls have closed, the public may observe the tabulation of votes at the Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Office, 1201 Sawnee Drive, Cumming, Georgia 30040. Election results will not be displayed and announced until all votes are tallied, with the exception of provisional votes which are tabulated at the time the Board of Voter Registrations & Elections (BRE) meets to certify the election.

Reporting Election Results

Election Results are reported by votes cast in person on Election Day, voted absentee ballots that have been returned to the Elections Office, votes cast in person during Advance Voting and provisional ballots cast that are accepted by the BRE prior to certification. On Election Night, election results may be viewed online at www.forsythco.com/vote or may be obtained by telephone at (770) 781-2118, ext. 9. Times when election results are available vary by election. All election results are **unofficial** until certified by the Forsyth County BRE. An **OFFICIAL** summary of the election results will be available online on the Voter Registrations & Elections Department webpage at www.forsythco.com/vote after the election has been certified.

Certification of Election Results


The BRE meets to certify the election results following Election Day, at which time the BRE also reviews all provisional ballots cast. The date and time for certification will be posted to the Forsyth County Voter Registrations & Elections Department webpage. *All election result totals are unofficial and incomplete until certified by the BRE.*

Post-Election Reconciliation

Audit

Georgia Election Code (O.C.G.A. 21-2-498) and State Election Board (SEB 183-1-15-.04) rules dictate that each county shall conduct a precertification risk-limiting audit (RLA) on one contest following any election, special election, election runoff, special election runoff, primary, special primary, primary runoff, or special primary runoff with federal or state-wide contests on the ballot. The RLA is scheduled to take place beginning May 30, 2024. The hours and location where the audit will take place in Forsyth County will be announced at a later date. The audit is open to the public to observe.



Election Definitions

An explanation of terms as used in this guide.

Absentee Voter: Per Georgia Election Code 21-2-380 (a) the term "absentee elector" means an elector of this state who casts a ballot in a primary, election or runoff other than in person at the polls on Election Day. Any voter who votes in person during Advance Voting or who requests their ballot be mailed to them is classified as an 'Absentee Voter.' They are 'absent' from their polling place on Election Day.

Ballot: A ballot is an "official ballot" or "paper ballot" and includes the instrument, whether paper, mechanical or electronic, by which an elector casts his or her vote.

Cure: The process used to correct any discrepancies on an absentee or provisional ballot in order to validate the ballot.

Elector: An elector is a person who possesses all the qualifications for voting now or hereafter prescribed by the laws of this state, including applicable charter provisions, and is a registered voter.

General Election: A general election is usually held at regular intervals in which candidates are elected in all or most constituencies of a nation, state or municipality.

Logic and Accuracy Testing: Logic and Accuracy Testing is a collection of pre-election procedures that insure the voting equipment and ballots to be used in an upcoming election can properly display the ballot, collect votes and tabulate results. Often referred to as L&A, these tests occur prior to the election and are conducted in such a way as to make public observation of the procedures and results possible.

Oath: An oath shall include affirmation.

Photo ID: All voters voting in person will be asked to provide one of the six acceptable forms of photo identification:

- Georgia driver's license (valid or expired)
- Valid ID card by any state or U.S. with photo
- Valid U.S. passport
- Valid government employee photo ID
- Valid U.S. military ID card with photo
- Valid tribal ID card with photo

First-time voters who registered by mail without providing a photo ID may also provide a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that contains the name and address of the voter.

Photo ID Card for Voting Purposes: If a voter does not have one of the forms of photo identification listed above, they are eligible to receive a free Georgia ID card for voting purposes ONLY. Contact the Voter Registrations & Elections Office at (770) 781-2118 to schedule an appointment to have a Photo ID card for voting purposes made.

Polling Place: A polling place is the room provided in each precinct for voting at a primary or election.

Precinct: A precinct is synonymous with the term "voting precinct" and means a geographical area from which all electors vote at a designated polling place.

Presidential Preference Primary: A presidential preference primary (PPP) is an open primary held for each political party so the electors may express their preference for one person to be the candidate for nomination by such person's party or body for the office of President of the United States. Georgia holds a Republican and a Democratic presidential preference primary in each year in which a presidential election is to be conducted. In Georgia, voters do not register by party, therefore the voter must select which ballot type they wish to vote at the time of each primary. There is no runoff election for a presidential preference primary.

Primary: A primary is any election held for the purpose of electing party officers or nominating candidates for public offices to be voted for at an election.

Provisional Ballot: A provisional ballot is a paper ballot used by a voter when their eligibility to vote cannot immediately be determined. There are several reasons when a provisional ballot may be an option for the voter, including, but not limited to: the voter has a good faith belief their name should appear on the voter rolls, but it does not appear; the voter does not have

one of the acceptable forms of photo identification; or the voter goes to the incorrect polling place on Election Day. The voter is provided additional instruction for curing their provisional ballot, if applicable. The Elections Office staff is allowed three additional days to conduct research. The Forsyth County Board of Voter Registrations & Elections (BRE) will ultimately determine whether to count or to reject the provisional ballots cast.

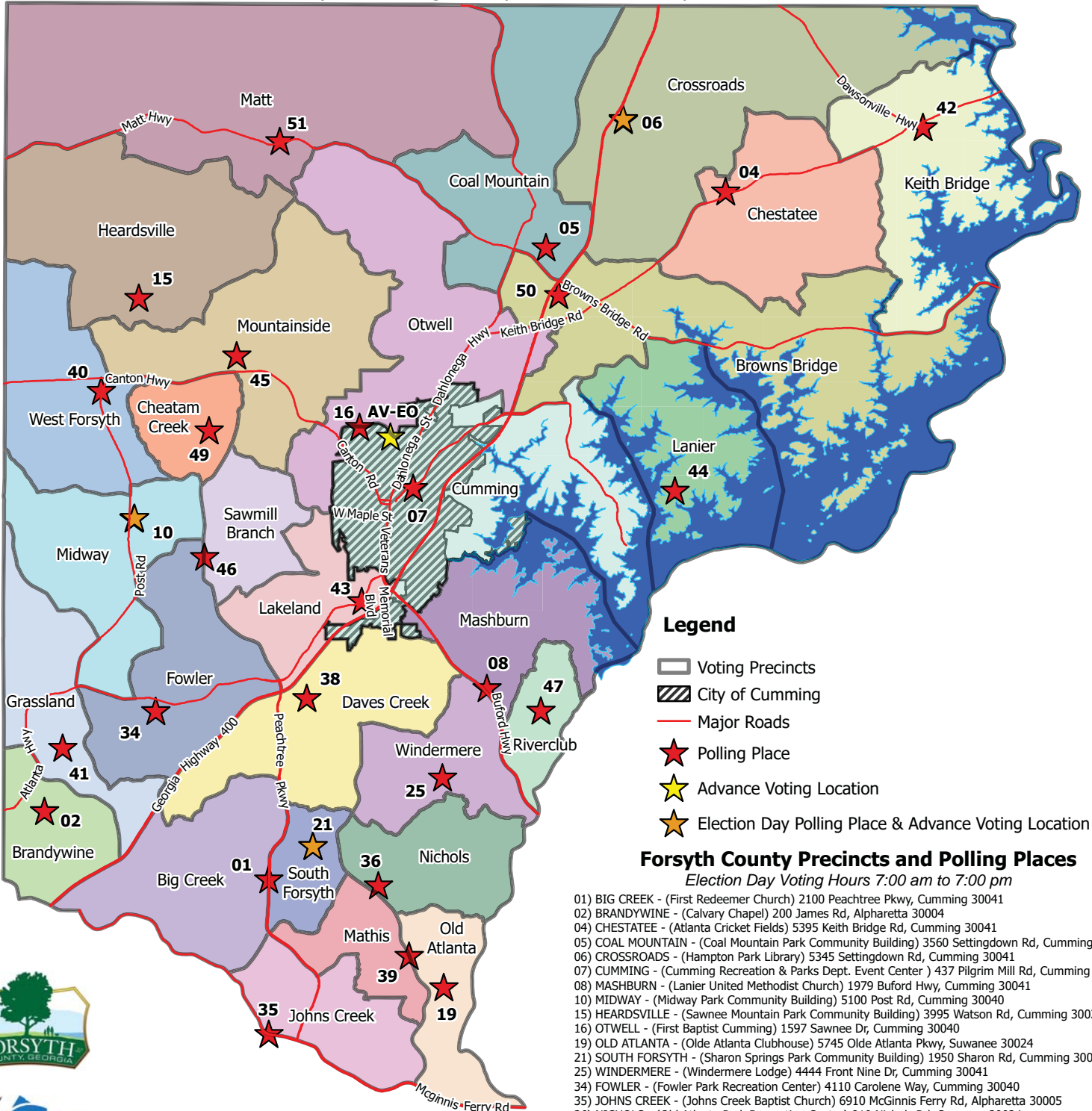
Special Election: A special election is an election scheduled on a date other than the usual date for a specific purpose, often to fill an office that has become vacant before the incumbent has completed the term or to pose a question to the voters. In Georgia, voters must be registered to vote 30 days prior to the election in order to be eligible to vote in the election and any subsequent runoff. A Voter Registration Application must be completely filled out and signed.

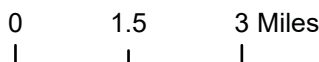

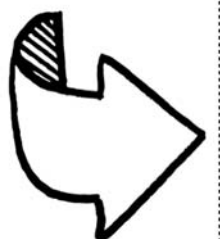

The **Nonpartisan** ballot type:

- contains **ONLY** the nonpartisan general election candidates for the state and county.
- **does NOT** contain any races/candidates/questions from either the Democratic or Republican Parties.

The Nonpartisan General Election contests also appear on the Democratic ballot type and on the Republican ballot type.
